- Over 83 percent of our seniors graduate within four years of entering high school compared to Florida's statewide average of 76 percent
- Flagler has one of the lowest dropout rates in the state: 2.5%
- Largest employer in Flagler County with 1741 employees
- Graduating class of 2010 received in excess of \$1,000,000 in scholarship money
- State-of-the-art facilities



School District of Flagler County 3rd Grade Reading FCAT

Reading 3rd Grade

FCAT Reading at 3rd grade is a high stakes assessment for students. Students who score at Level 1 face mandatory retention.

The district has been consistently above the state for students scoring level 3 and above in Reading for Grade 3.

The district schools have had a consistent performance in school grades over the past five years.

Advanced Placement (AP) In 2009-2010,

393 students took
AP classes and a
total of 738 unique
exams.

Exams were taken in Biology,
Calculus, Economics, Art
History, English, Government,
Physics, Psychology, French,
Spanish, Statistics, Studio Art,
U.S. History and World
History.

Students scoring 3 or above on a scale of 1-5 are eligible to receive college credit. Flagler students earned 370 credits on AP Exams in 2010.



International Baccalaureate (IB)

The district offers an IB program.

In 2009-2010, 64 students took 254 exam sessions. In IB classes, a subject area examination could have two or three sessions.

IB examinations were taken in the following courses:

Psychology, History of
Americas, English, Spanish,
Math Studies, Theory of
Knowledge, Extended Essay
and Creativity Action in
Service.

33 Students earned an IB diploma in 2010.

 Sponsors an After School Snack Program and the Summer Food Service Program, providing meals to hundreds of children each day


Free and Reduced Lunch participation increased from 42% to 59%

Transportation

- * 10,965 students transported on 96 routes

- 97 Regular Buses and 30 buses equipped for students with disabilities

What challenges do we face?

- Serve over 250 homeless children
- 285 active ESOL students
- 3,891 (30%) Students reading below grade level
- Increased graduation requirements
- More than 50% of our students below the poverty level

Florida's Strategic Vision is to change the culture of schools from Pre-K to postsecondary education by raising the expectations for all students. This will better prepare students for success in the 21st century.

These increased graduation requirements raise the rigor of classes at every grade level from kindergarten through twelfth grade.


US History: EOC projected in 2013-14. Passing score not scheduled to be a part of graduation criteria.

Civics EOC Field Test in 2012-13 at Middle Grades Level. EOC is part of Civics grade in 2013-14. Must pass EOC to earn Civics credit for promotion to HS in 2014-15.

All students who take Algebra, Geometry, and Biology in Flagler County must comply with the same requirements as the 2010-11 9th grade cohort.

What have we done to prepare?

- Streamlined bus routes
- Enforced the two-mile rule at middle and high schools
- Enforced 1 mile-walk for elementary school students
- Reduced employees from 1,900 to 1,740 or by 160 employees over the past 3 years while increasing student population by 400
- Moved from block scheduling to a 7-period day at high schools

- Reduced after-school tutoring programs
- Eliminated summer school
- Cut 75% of our after-school clubs and activities
- Reduced after-school transportation for athletics and activities
- Cut both in-county and out-of-county travel

How is this going to impact our children?

*These are the possibilities.....

*Reduced hours for high school and middle school students

Continued reductions in sports and academic activities/clubs

*Reduced electives and educational programs for all students

*Continued freeze on hiring that negatively impacts service to students *Blending of grade levels at elementary schools or the designation of an overflow school to meet class size
