Flagler County Population and Crime Rate 2017-2021





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COURT & DETENTION SERVICES – STOPPING RECIDIVISM & AWARD WINNING JAIL



S.M.A.R.T. PROGRAM

Thanks to a grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance Criminal Justice Mental Health Collaboration Program, the Flagler County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) received a \$530,000 grant to fund an in-custody treatment program for inmates in its detention facility in Bunnell. The FCSO is one of only three Sheriff's Offices across the country to receive this funding.

As a result, Sheriff Staly launched a new evidence based in-custody treatment program February 28 to help local inmates succeed once they are released back into Flagler County. Sheriff Staly dubbed his jail program, "S.M.A.R.T.," for Successful Mental Health and Addiction Recovery Treatment.



Since the program's inception in May 2022, 42 inmates have graduated from SMART and have returned to the community. 36 of them – or 86% – have stayed on the path to successful recovery.



Flagler now the third-fastest-growing county in the fastest-growing state

Flagler County is the third-fastest-growing county in the fastest-growing state, a recent Census Bureau release shows.

Home to Palm Coast, which – according to a University of Florida population estimate – is now the most populous city in the Volusia-Flagler area, Flagler has surged from one of the state's least populous counties to the 35th largest of 67.

Palm Coast grew 10.3 percent between 2020 and 2022, to 98,411 people, according to the Census Bureau's latest estimate, released today. The city is on pace to cross well past the 100,000 threshold this year, and based on the last two years' trend, likely did so in February or March.

The city's torrid growth pace makes it the 18th-fastest growing city in the nation in that span (out of 796 cities with populations of 50,000 or more), and the fifth-fastest growing in Florida, behind North Port (13.8 percent growth), Port St. Lucie (13.1), Cape Coral (11.9), and Fort Myers (11.1).

Palm Coast is now the 24th-largest city in Florida, surpassing Melbourne, Fort Myers and Sunrise in the last few years and making gains on Boca Raton. And Flagler County is the third-fastest growing county in the state.

Palm Coast's growth aspirations boosted by expected \$54 million in state budget projects

PALM COAST – Despite attracting its first residents only 51 years ago, Palm Coast has edged past Deltona to become the most populous city in the Volusia-Flagler region, according to University of Florida researchers.

And it's going to get bigger. A lot bigger. Palm Coast may be a top 20 city in the state by 2050, a projection embraced by Mayor David Alfin.

That explosion in growth shows no sign of slowing as the Legislature in its 2023-2024 budget, expected to be approved soon, has set aside at least \$54 million for the city, according to state Rep. Tom Leek, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

That includes money for several projects, including \$25 million to extend Matanzas Woods Parkway west into largely vacant land that's primed for development.





NOTE: Study does not include growth caused impact to Detention, Court Services, 9-1-1 Communications and Professional support.





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



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The Breakdown of Average Costs per Deputy - \$142,548





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COST REDUCTION MEASURES

- Volunteers contributed 23,623 volunteer hours, saving the taxpayers more than \$800,000.
- Inmate work crews provided over \$100,000 in labor value by maintaining the landscape needs for many County owned properties.
- Increasing efficiency and reducing crime by employing a district and guardianship policing model which enhances service delivery efficiency.

 Crime is down -54% since 2016.
- Embracing a culture of innovation which capitalizes on technology and process improvements.
- FCSO Detention Services has implemented an inmate graphics program in partnership with Flagler Technical College. All equipment was purchased at no cost to the taxpayers using the Inmate Welfare Account. This program not only prepares inmates for a trade in graphic arts but saves taxpayer money as inmates design, print and apply all graphics on Sheriff's vehicles and other government vehicles.
- FCSO recently spearheaded an agreement with the Florida Sheriff's Association Inmate Medical Billing program and the BOCC. Since October 1st, inmate medical fees billed the BOCC \$1,195,720 but the actual cost was reduced to \$608,619 due to use of lower contracted rates in the new program. This is money saved in the BOCC budget as the BOCC budget includes this line item.

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FUTURE OPPORTUNITIES/CHALLENGES

Law Enforcement Agency's in St. Johns, Volusia, Putnam Raising Salaries

- St. Johns County Sheriff Starting Pay will be \$55,000 October 1 Goal of \$60,000 by FY24-25
- Volusia County Sheriff's Office already at \$51,500 October 1???
- Putnam County Sheriff's Office at \$47,000 getting \$1.2m state money as a financially stressed county for LE salaries

Flagler Deputy Sheriff starting pay is \$50,200 today. With a 5.3% COLA on October 1 will be \$52,861 – We are falling behind!

- Today, very low turnover rate 3%. Law Enforcement is at 4 over-hire; Detention is down 2, Professional support is down 3
- To hire, attend state academy and field train a Deputy Sheriff takes 1-year.

Total cost of hiring and training a new Deputy Sheriff is \$150,000 – It's less expensive to retain but must pay competitive to retain.

State keeps raising FRS rates

- In FY20-21 Special Risk (Deputy Sheriffs/Firefighters) rates were 24.45% of salary
- In FY23-24 Special Risk (Deputy Sheriffs/Firefighters) rates have zoomed to 32.67% of salary starting 7/1/23
 - Total FRS cost from FY23-24 budget is estimated at \$6,075,912.00
 - In FY20-21 this cost was 4,065,157
 - That's a 33.1% increase in 3 years these rates are mandatory by the state and not negotiable



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FUTURE OPPORTUNITIES/CHALLENGES

- Jacksonville criminals are increasingly coming to Flagler County to Commit Crimes
- Violent Daytona criminal element connection to Bunnell and Palm Coast
- Technology has helped us reduce crime BUT
 - Need deputies to respond when LPR hits occur or technology is useless
 - To do this must maintain and increase staffing as community grows or you risk losing ground
- Flagler County ranks 46 out of 67 counties in combined city and county public safety expenditures (LE, Fire/Rescue, EM)
 - Ranking bottom 1/3 of all Florida County's
- Statewide average spending per capita for public safety = \$977.81
- Flagler County spending per capital for public safety = \$640.83
 - 35% less than state average
