

1. During the effort to save the Belle Terre Swim and Racquet Club solutions were proposed that would have transferred the Club from the school district to the City of Palm Coast at no cost. The club would then become a part of the city's Parks and Recreation Department. What are your thoughts on this prospect and would it be something you feel could be pursued?
2. The club's central location in the city, the 11 acres of land that is part of the club, and its capability for development have spurred interest by some in adding a city senior center to the site. What is your position on this possibility?
3. After years of operational losses, the club is now at break even and growing in revenue. The Advisory Committee is a Florida non-profit corporation with a 501 c 3 designation. Do you believe the city could partner with the Advisory Committee to obtain grants for program and facility expansion?
4. Palm Coast Administration is known for its strong working relationship with members of the city council. However, interactions with average citizens have sometimes been characterized as "cool" or "aloof". Do you agree and if so how would you resolve this perception?
5. If elected your term would be for four years. We are hoping to elect leaders. Where would you like to lead Palm Coast in the next four years?
6. Parks and recreation have always been a cornerstone of Palm Coast since its inception. Currently two facilities, the tennis courts and the golf course, have drawn criticism for their cost to the city. What is your position on these costs and the costs of recreational facilities in general?
