## The Yellow Dragon

A fierce yellow dragon has crossed the great sea and now has Florida in its death grip. Huanglongbing, as it is known in its native China, HLB or citrus greening, as it is known in Florida, is a killer.


HLB is a tree killing bacteria that is vectored by another Chinese import, the Asian Citrus Psyllid (ACP.) First discovered in Florida in 1998, the ACP transmits the HLB bacteria by feeding on the leaves of a citrus tree. The bacteria enter the phloem, which is the photosynthetic lifeline of the tree, and is transported to the roots, blooms, fruits and seeds.

It is estimated that HLB is present in 80%, or more, of all citrus trees in Florida, as well as Africa, South America and Asia. After infection, a tree will decline. The leaves will become blotchy and mottled,, the fruit will be greenish in color, misshapen, small and often drop from the tree prematurely.

The pinnacle of Florida citrus production was achieved in the 1997-98 season, with a massive crop of 244 million boxes. The 2017-18 crop is predicted to be 46 million or less. Hurricane Irma, development, and of course, HLB has put many growers, packers and processing facilities out of business. Many growers continue the fight with expensive pesticide spraying in hopes of controlling the ACP. The results are mixed, and the cost has caused many growers to abandon their groves. These abandoned groves are a breeding ground for the psyllid and HLB.

What is the answer? Scientists and growers are working feverishly to develop root stocks and scions that are tolerant to HLB. The results are encouraging, but the silver bullet is elusive. The industry would need to replant 3 million trees per year for 10 years to get back to past production levels.

Biological control through the release of the Tamarixia Radiata Wasp has been successful on a limited basis. Many scientists and growers believe the answer is Transgenics. Genetically engineered cultivars have been deregulated in 25 different crops. GMO is a dirty word to many, but the benefits could save the Florida Citrus Industry. An antimicrobial peptide found in spinach has proven to cause bacterial cell death of the HLB bacteria. The fighting spirit of the American farmer and the dedication of our research scientists will find an answer. We will slay the dragon!

## Carrots Used To Be Purple!

It is thought that carrots were discovered in Asia around northwest India. Cultivation of carrots for medicinal purposes began 2000 to 3000 years ago. Carrots used to come in shades of purple, white, red, yellow, and black, until the late 16<sup>th</sup> century.

At that time Dutch growers experimented with mutant strains of carrots that did not have the purple pigment anthocyanin, and developed the orange color that has become very popular today. Lately the purple shades of carrots are coming back into popularity among many foodie circles.

The Vegetable Improvement Center at Texas A&M recently developed a purple-skinned, orange fleshed carrot called the Beta Sweet. This carrot is specialized to include substances that are thought to help prevent cancer. It also has extremely high beta-carotene content.

Carrots are one of the healthiest vegetables you can eat. They are high in vitamin A, and contain alpha and beta carotene, lutein and lycopene. Carrot seeds and greens are also known to have medicinal properties. Florida currently grows an estimated 5,000 acres of carrots annually.

## Cracker Corner

Spring comes early in Florida. I suppose it is more accurate to say that spring planting time comes early, since the actual astronomical spring occurs every year when the sun crosses the equator on its trip north. This year, 2018, that is on March 20th, according to The Old Farmer's Almanac. Spring planting time is something else entirely. If you wait until the Spring Equinox to plant your spring garden, in most of Florida, the summer sun will burn it to a crisp before you can harvest much.

Growing up in Central Florida, I learned a good bit from my elders about planting by the 'signs'. My Mom, Grandma and Great Grandmother all believed in certain 'signs', or happenings, to signal changes in the seasons and optimum planting dates. One of those, of course, is the Moon and planting by the Moon has garnered a good bit of attention in some gardening publications. Certain crops should always be planted during certain phases of the Moon, or so the wives tale goes. I suspect a lot of that has to do with the amount of light reflected by it. Other 'signs' of the passing of winter that the old timers believed in are the appearance of Phlox in the fields and orange groves and also hearing the first whippoorwill at night

These were indicators of the last of the hard freezes and killing frosts. For me, one of the most accurate 'signs' in planning and planting a spring garden is the appearance of Poke. Once the Poke starts to poke through the sandy soil I know it's time to plant the first of the spring 'greens'. Collards, mustard and turnips are a few of my favorite. While all three of these will overwinter well here, and can be picked and eaten if prepared correctly, by the end of winter they are starting to get a bit 'rangy' and are better left to "go to seed", except for the turnip roots, which you should have been harvesting and enjoying all winter. Turnips are a love-em or hate-em vegetable, but, I have a recipe which might make even the most diehard hater into a lover. Ask me nicely and I might share it with you.

So, get that garden ready and start planting your spring garden, before summer sneaks in and changes everything.


