

Re: Week in Review

In the past week, the department responded to a total of 205 calls. There were six fire calls. We responded to a building fire, cooking fire, passenger vehicle fire, brush fire and two miscellaneous fires. A total of 133 EMS calls were logged and the balance was miscellaneous in nature. The drought index is at 339 out of a possible 800 and the fire danger is high.

This week and next, Life Scan is conducting examinations on all of our Firefighters. A medical, physical exam is required for all Firefighters every year who are expected to enter an atmosphere that is an immediate danger to their life or health (IDLH). If they have to wear an air pack, they must have the physical conducted. This is a good way for the employee to identify health concerns in their infancy. The program has already been proven successful in identifying serious health issues with the Firefighters and have reduced their downtime from months to weeks/days.

The Chiefs presented the After Actions Report for Hurricane Matthew with 18 recommendations for future improvement. At the conclusion of the presentation the 18 recommendations were broken into several categories for implementation. A team will be created through Beau Falgout's office to complete the recommendations.

Deputy Chief Forte attended a Multi-Year Training and Exercise Planning (MYTEP) meeting that identifies regional training opportunities that would benefit the City or County. Several classes were identified such as Active Shooter, Debris Management and Monitoring, and Damage Assessment.

Deputy Chief Forte and Flagler Beach Chief Pace were invited by Chief Beadle to be guest speakers at Flagler College, for the Emergency Management classes that he instructs. They both presented a wealth of knowledge on the subject of Emergency Management.

1. The Healthcare Provider course -- a professional certification course -- includes a multiple-choice written exam and a practical exam.
2. Workbooks for use during the class are provided. It is highly recommend that participants purchase a course workbook. The American Heart Association recommends that each student review the course information for two weeks prior to the course. Workbooks can be found at : <http://www.aha.channing-bete.com/>
3. Course available to those ages 13 and up.
4. All courses begin at 9:00 a.m. Participants should arrive a few minutes ahead of time for check-in.
5. A minimum of six persons is required for each course date. If fewer than six persons have registered, each person will be contacted to reschedule or to receive a refund.

First Aid and CPR/AED

Heartsaver First Aid is a 7-hour classroom course (*includes 1 hour for lunch*) that is designed to meet OSHA regulations. The course teaches basic first aid skills:

- Administering CPR to an infant, young child, or an adult.
- Using an Automated External Defibrillator (AED).
- Using a mask or barrier device.
- How to stop visible bleeding.
- Assist with possible sprain or broken bone.
- Securing the scene for safety.

Healthcare Provider

The Basic Life Support (BLS) for Healthcare Providers Course provides healthcare professionals the ability to recognize several life-threatening emergencies, administer CPR, use an AED, and relieve choking in a safe, effective and timely manner.

Examples of those who may need this certification are: EMS personnel, physician assistants, dentists, nurses, respiratory therapists and others. All must have a credential (card) documenting successful completion of a CPR course.

The 4.5-hour course is video-based with instructor-led discussion and simulation. Students participate, practice, and complete various skills and learning stations. We will provide a workbook for you to borrow during the course. However, we recommend you purchase a workbook two weeks prior to the course and review the information.

Re: Week in Review

- Customer Service and the Wastewater Division have teamed up to begin the process of going paperless for work orders. We started the process on March 23rd. IT has provided the Wastewater division with four Microsoft Surfaces for the field guys so they can bring up the work orders electronically and complete the work order after the work is performed. This process will save a lot of time and also help the city with staying green.
- The temporary conversion to chlorine as the primary disinfectant for drinking water was completed on March 22rd. The normal process has resumed.
- The average water demand for this week was 8.289 million gallons per day. The average wastewater flow was 5.954 million gallons per day.
- Crews installed 30 new domestic water meters and 3 new PEP tanks.
- There was a total of 42 calls after hours.
- There were 240 disconnects for non-payment this week.
- On Tuesday a flushing hydrant was replaced on Flintstone Court which affected 45 homes on Flintstone Court, Fletcher Court and Flowerhill Drive for approximately 9 hours.
- On Tuesday a broken fire hydrant was replaced which affected 49 customers on Westgrill, Westminster Drive and West Place for 7 hours.
- On Thursday, line power was lost at Water Treatment Plant #2; both backup generators came on. FPL was notified. As of Thursday afternoon, we were waiting for the FPL crew to show up to replace a bad switch.
- Wastewater crews completed 90 service orders, replaced 36 pep pumps, 46 floats and 6 cleanout caps. Replaced 4 ball valves, 4 valve boxes, installed 2 risers, and replaced 1 back lid, 1 pep chamber, and 4 pep panels.
- Wastewater crews inspected via CCTV 9,574 feet of gravity sewer and inspected 53 manholes.
- Water Distribution crews repaired 4 service lines, replaced/repared 14 meter pits, and tested/repared 373 backflow preventers.
- Wastewater Treatment Plant - Staff tore down failed sludge cake pump and determined the parts needed for repair. Parts have been ordered and are being sent by air-freight from Germany. Until that part is received and the repair is made, the plant is unable process the biosolids for removal.
- This week crews completed safety training with TECO Gas and two technicians attended training on Flygt Pumps in Orlando.
- Tipo Toomalatia performed environmental education for Bunnell Elementary students on water preservation, wetlands and water/wastewater.

‘Abnormally dry’ conditions prompt need for additional water conservation

Palm Coast – Below-average rainfall in seven north-central Florida counties including Flagler and concerns about the effects of the “abnormally dry” conditions on water resources have prompted the St. Johns River Water Management District to issue a Water Shortage Warning Order. The objective of the order is to reduce water use and ensure enough water is available to meet demand.

The City of Palm Coast regularly practices many water conservation strategies – both for City operations and for Palm Coast residents and businesses.

Because of the new Water Shortage Warning Order, the City would like to remind citizens of some water restrictions, as well as offer tips for reducing water use during this time of potential prolonged drought.

“April is Water Conservation Month in Florida, but it’s important for all of us to save water year-round, especially in times of low rainfall and low water conditions,” said Palm Coast Utility Director Richard Adams. “Water is a precious natural resource – a commodity that cannot be taken for granted. Let’s all do our part to save water wherever we can.”

Irrigation Policy

The City’s landscape irrigation policy reflects the Water Management District’s watering restrictions year-round. During Daylight Saving Time, residences and businesses may water lawns and shrubs twice a week. Odd-numbered residential addresses irrigate on Wednesdays and Saturdays, while even-numbered residential addresses irrigate on Thursdays and Sundays. Businesses irrigate on Tuesdays and Fridays.

For users of private irrigation wells, irrigation is allowed any time except between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on your designated day. For customers using the City’s water system, irrigation is allowed only between midnight and 10 a.m. on your designated day. Irrigation is limited to $\frac{3}{4}$ inch of water per irrigation zone and to no more than one hour per irrigation zone.

Hand-held hoses equipped with automatic shut-off nozzles and drip systems/bubblers are allowed at any time. When reclaimed water is available for irrigation use, the use of private irrigation wells is not authorized.

These restrictions apply to water withdrawn from ground or surface water, from a public or private well or pump or from a public or private water utility. They do not apply to irrigation using reclaimed water or storm water.

Water Conservation Tips

- **Bathing.** Taking a bath requires up to 70 gallons of water. A five-minute shower uses only 10 to 25 gallons. While you're at it, time your shower to keep it under 5 minutes. You'll save up to 1,000 gallons per month and that totals to \$8.50 monthly. Even a step further, by installing a 2.5 gpm showerhead to replace a 5.5 gpm showerhead, a family of four can save 27,000 gallons of water per year. That's a savings of \$223!
- **Washing dishes.** When washing dishes by hand, use a spray device instead of running the water to rinse. This can save you 6,000 gallons per year, which totals out to \$49.50. But even better, run the dishwasher instead of washing by hand. It uses less hot water and could save you \$40 a year.
- **Check for leaks.** At 1 drip per second, a faucet can leak 3,000 gallons per year. The amount of water leaked from U.S. homes could exceed more than 1 trillion gallons per year. That equals the annual water use of Los Angeles, Chicago, and Miami combined. To check for leaks, read your water meter before and after a 1-hour period when no water is being used. (Remember to wait for the ice maker to refill and for the regeneration of water softeners.) If the readings are different after the hour, you have a leak. Also, monitor your bill for unusually high use.
- **Check your toilets.** A running toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water per day. Also, installing a low-flow toilet can save you as much as 9,855 gallons of water per year; that's \$81.30.
- **Reduce energy consumption.** It takes water to make energy! By reducing energy use by just 10 percent, you could save 600 gallons of a water a year and \$150 in energy bills!
- **Turn it off.** Turn off the water while you brush your teeth, wash your face, shave, wash dishes or clean house. The average faucet flows at a rate of 2 gallons per minute. You can save up to four gallons of water a day by turning off the faucet while you brush your teeth.
- **Washing clothes.** For washing machines with variable settings for water volume, select the minimum amount required per load. Otherwise wash only full loads. Also keep in mind that newer clothes washers use an average of 18 gallons of water per load. Older and non-water efficient washing machines can use as much as 40 gallons of water per load. That's a waste of 12 gallons per load and \$26 per year.
- **Landscaping.** Select native-Florida trees and shrubs that need less watering when landscaping.
- **Pools.** Covering your spa or pool can prevent it from losing water to evaporation. You can save as much as 12,000 gallons of water per year, that's \$99!
- **Food preparation.** When rinsing vegetables, use a filled pan instead of letting the water run. By doing this you can save 2,400 gallons of water per year. That's \$19.80!
- **Water a plant.** Never put water down the drain when there may be another use for it, such as watering a plant or cleaning.

- **Limit flushes.** Don't use the toilet as an ashtray or wastebasket. Every time you flush a cigarette butt, facial tissue or other small bit of trash, five to seven gallons of water is wasted.
- **Car washing.** If you use a bucket to wash your car, you can save 150 gallons of water every time you don't use the hose.

Palm Coast Citizens Academy graduates 39th class; register now for May class

Palm Coast – Twenty-one Palm Coast residents graduated this month from the Palm Coast Citizens Academy, a comprehensive program designed to educate interested residents about the operation and workings of their City government.

The graduating class – the 39th in the program’s history – spent five weeks learning about City departments and visiting City Hall, main Fire Station 25, and Water Treatment Plant No. 3. The class also attended a Palm Coast City Council meeting together.

Mayor Milissa Holland kicked off the Citizens Academy with an opening session titled, “Governing the City,” providing background on Palm Coast’s incorporation, City Charter, the Council-Manager form of government, and overall information about the City.
