10	MR. MATHIS: Your copy's over there. The
11	victim impact statements.
12	MR. KOCIJAN: Did you get a copy of the PSI in
13	this case?

9	Carson and Stef I worked with Carson; I met
10	him there.
11	And first time I met him, it was all about his
12	family and his wife and he everything. It was
13	just that's all he cared about. That was his
14	major concern.
15	I met Stef, we spent time with them. The kids
16	have been to the house. We just always had a good
17	time. They always had a good rapport.
18	And this had to be an accident. There's
19	nothing else it could have been.
20	That's that's
21	MR. KOCIJAN: Mr. Rizzo.
22	THE WITNESS: Knowing Carson, I do know that
23	it was an accident, because I talked to him a
24	couple days before, and he had just bought his wife
25	a brand new truck, and he was putting a stereo in

1	it for her. He had never been nothing but
2	respectful and were the best of friends.
3	I mean, he'd take the shirt off his back to
4	help you if you needed anything. He was always
5	there for everybody. And he was a good family man.
6	Always brought the kids to the house. We'd go up
7	there, you know.
8	That's it.
9	THE COURT: All right. Thank you.
10	Any questions?
11	MR. MATHIS: Ms. Rizzo, you said you worked
12	with him?
13	THE WITNESS: Yes.
14	MR. MATHIS: At the Toyota place?
15	THE WITNESS: No. Tensolite.
16	MR. MATHIS: Tensolite?

18	MR. MATHIS: That was several years back?

7	Mr. and Mrs. Merrill?
8	THE WITNESS: I'd say about eight, nine years.
9	MR. KOCIJAN: Okay. You may have to speak up
10	a little bit.
11	THE WITNESS: Okay.
12	MR. KOCIJAN: Sorry.
13	So eight, nine years?
14	THE WITNESS: Uh-huh.
15	MR. KOCIJAN: Okay. And you'd like to address
16	the Court, ma'am?
17	THE WITNESS: Yeah. Oh, God.
18	There is no way to put into words the feeling
19	a person feels when losing a loved one. In my
2 0	case, my best friend, a sister, a person I spent
21	every day with. It is an every day struggle living
22	without my best friend to call and tell about my
23	day to, or to call for advice about something like
2 4	I did with Stefanie. But it's even more of an
25	every day struggle for Carson to have to live the

rest of his life without his wife, or as he would call her, his baby, there by his side.

I have never seen a man have as much love for a woman as Carson did for Stefanie. The look I would see in that man's eyes, every time I would catch him starring at her, was nothing but a look full of love and a smile full of happiness. A look that in the 25 years my parents have been married, I have -- I have still yet to see.

I remember getting so mad at them. I would be at the house hanging out with Stefanie, or trying to at least, and Carson would be working and they must have called each other 20 times within an hour just to say a simple "I love you."

And then Carson would get home, and I would start to lecture him about how it wasn't necessary to call her 20 times a day. And his reply was always the same: "When you love a woman as much as I, you do," with a big ole smile on his face.

I understand if a person does wrong, there are consequences to be made. But Carson has to live with the worst punishment he would receive: Living without his wife; his best friend; his soulmate; not being able to grow old together and watch their amazing children grow as adults.

A child needs their parents through every little obstacle life brings them. Stef will always be right there by their side in spirit, but Carson's the one who will be able to walk his little girl down the aisle one day, and take his son on fishing trips like he has always wanted to, and to be able to make trips to go visit Jack -- their -- his other son, Jackson, and be able to do things a father's supposed to do.

Moriah, Carson, Jackson -- and Jackson love their father so much and needs them [verbatim] just as much as Carson needs them right now.

I love and miss Stefanie more than anything, and I would do absolutely anything if I could ever bring her back to see her beautiful smile just one more time. But knowing Stefanie, as well as I did, I know this isn't what she would have wanted.

Carson is the most amazing father I have ever met and needs to be able to be there to be able to love for them and take care of them just as Stef would have wanted.

Carson has spent the last nine month alone, having to relive that awful morning each day over and over again in his head, and, in my opinion, a place he does not belong.

1	I'm not asking you to let him off scotch free,
2	Your Honor, but not to let him spend the rest to
3	spend years behind bars. I don't feel as if it
4	would do any good for anybody, and most
5	importantly, his children.
6	Before I go, please just know from the bottom
7	of my heart I know this was nothing but a tragic
8	accident. Because I can promise you, if I had any
9	doubt in my mind it was anything but, there would
10	be no way I would be standing here for Carson
11	today.
12	Stefanie was what Carson's life revolved
13	around. She was not only a wife to him, but was
14	also his best friend.
15	THE COURT: Thank you.

18	Ms. Curley, were you aware of all the guns
19	they had in the house?
2 0	THE WITNESS: I didn't know that they had as
21	many as they did, but

25	MR. MATHIS: And you knew he was a convicted

23	He became we have three biological
24	children, and he became our fourth.
25	He and his family lived about five minutes

from us. He was with us on every family vacation.

He was with us on fishing trips, hunting trips,

anything -- if we visited our family or any

vacations, he was always right there with us and

part of our family.

He brought to our home so much laughter and so much joy, and he actually motivated our children to do their chores. He never -- he had the utmost respect for us and our family. He would motivate our children to do their chores, "Let's get it done. Let's not argument. Let's not fuss." It was just amazing what he did with our family and the place that he holds.

He's just -- he -- to this day, he still addresses us as Mr. and Ms. Guffey.

And when he moved here a few years ago, we continued to have phone conversations. He would always call us almost -- if I forgot, almost every two or three weeks. He would place a phone call just to see how we're doing and check on us. And we -- he continually talked about his wife and his children. 19	We've grown up, and our children have now
20	grown up. I have three daughters of my own.
21	He is so loving. He is caring. He loves his
22	family, and he loves Stefanie.
23	I had the opportunity to visit Carson about
24	once a year when I was able to take a family
25	vacation and come down. Whether I went to Disney,

whether I went to the beach, I always made arrangements to come and see Carson and Stefanie and the kids while we were here so that our children could play with them.

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We would -- talked regularly on the phone.

Whether it'd be two or three times a week or once a month, we would always catch up. We constantly would send e-mails or text messages and pictures back and forth.

I can tell you that Carson loves Stefanie with all his heart. If he could go back, he would trade places with her any given day.

I truly believe in my heart this was an accident, and Carson does not deserve -- his children do not deserve for him to sit in jail. It will not do him or the children any good. He loves them. He needs to be with them and take care of them. He needs to be able to go into this world and better himself and use his mistakes to better others.

He loves Stefanie.

THE COURT: Thank you.

And, you know, I just can't imagine that -- it was a tragedy. I mean, a tragedy. I'm sure that he is suffering every day. I cannot imagine incarceration being worse than what he goes through every day of his life.

He's got kids. And I know they adored him. I had observed their interaction numerous times when I would visit the house.

There is no question. No question in my mind, it was an accident. A tragedy. And I just hate to see it to be continued. It's -- it's going to be -- he's going to suffer the rest of his life.

19	Carson's friendship and loyalty have never
20	been a question. He's always been supportive and
21	honest, regardless of the outcome.
22	I've always known him to be very
23	compassionate, enthusiastic with those around him.
24	He's a very optimistic he has a very optimistic
25	outlook on his life and the life of his family. He

truly loves the people around him, and this is -- was shown in more ways than I can count on.

I'm at a complete loss for words because you can't sum up somebody's life in five minutes in a court hearing. And you can't look at the negative things somebody's done and judge them based on that, even though you're forced to.

All I can say is that he truly loves those around him. He loves his family. Even if there's negative consequences in his own life, he's willing to go out of the way to help others.

I can't count the number of times that I myself have had Carson help me out and my family.

And like I said, you just can't sum those up in a few words. And you can truly never know him without actually knowing him and being around him.

Today I've talked to a few people that have just known him for a few short months. And some people here today have only known him for a matter of months. And everything they have to say about him is optimistic. And, you know, his general outlook, you know, towards his family and his wife are just, you know -- you know, without words.

I mean, you can't describe how somebody loves somebody and how somebody loves their family. You

can't describe in a few sentences, you know, how complex their relationship was. I mean, all relationships are very complex among people and you can't sum up a lifetime of -- of those relationships, you know, today. It would take, you know, me hours for me to sum that up and you still wouldn't understand how important Carson is to me.

And that's not a -- I'm not family with him.

It's not a external forced relationship in any way.

This has all come about through me knowing Carson

as a person and knowing him his whole life.

And I do believe unequivocally, and without a doubt, that his actions, regardless of how irresponsible and stupid they were, are without intent or malice of any kind. And I truly believe that in my heart.

And I don't that somebody can be what would be more remorseful than Carson would be after this incident took place. I've only spoken to him a few times, and I don't think -- you know, I can't explain the conversations that we had or that we have had since then, but I know that's -- that has affected him more than anything else in his life, and rightfully so.

And that's -- that's all I really have to say.

7	THE WITNESS: I'm his biological dad.
8	MR. KOCIJAN: Okay. And you'd like to address
9	the Court, sir?
10	THE WITNESS: Yes.
11	Just about everything everybody said is the
12	truth. He's just a good person. If you can't see
13	that by now from all these people that's been up
14	here, he he's just there's not a bad bone in
15	his body.
16	His days off was a Wednesday. I had a riding
17	mower self-propelled mower. I just moved down
18	here a year and a half ago. He would come over
19	there with his daughter, other kid child would
20	be in school. He'd cut his yard first, and then
21	come cut mine. He's you know, I could have done
22	it, but he wouldn't let me. He's that kind of

3	THE COURT: Thank you.
4	THE WITNESS: Your Honor, this letter is to
5	describe the loss of my sister how the loss of
6	my sister has affected my family and I.
7	Unfortunately, I don't believe that it is
8	possible for me to put into words the pain, the
9	anger, outrage or the pure hate which has followed
10	this tragic and avoidable shooting.
11	As children we're taught to obey the law and
12	to never point a weapon at anyone; much less, a
13	loved one.
14	As young adults, taught only to use a weapon
15	in self-defense.
16	As a soldier, I was taught that you point a
17	weapon at a target, you take aim, and then you pull
18	the trigger. And that is exactly what has
19	happened.
20	With or without the knowledge of it being
21	loaded, the Defendant, Carson, picked up an AK-47
22	assault riffle not a soft you know, an
23	Airsoft or a toy, mind you and pointed it at
24	Stefanie. He then took aim at her, center mass,
25	and pulled the trigger. No one goes through those

motions without the subconscious intent to do harm to another.

In the hours and days following that dreadful phone call, it was like having flashbacks. Little bits here and there of times with Stef and phone conversations. I remembered every conversation in which Stefanie had expressed concern or confess an incident that had occurred between her and the Defendant, Carson.

Some of the other memories that would race through my mind would be Stefanie calling, saying, "You're not going to believe what your nephew's done now," or talking about Moriah trying to pronounce a word and it coming out way wrong.

But to this day, every day, I think about the night before Stefanie was shot. My son and I were wrestling in the living room when the phone rang, and little Randy asked, "It's Aunt Stefanie. Are you going to answer it?"

I told him I'd call her back in the morning; that I wanted to finish our wrestling match. I never got the chance to talk to her again.

We had decided for the sake of the children that it would -- that we would only tell them that Stefanie had fallen. My eight-year-old son was

given that information as well. After the drive to Florida and hearing more of the details, we, as a family, decided that we need to explain to little Randy what happened. We were afraid that he would start talking about hunting or guns around his cousins.

Little Randy had been around firearms his entire life. He even has a few of his own. But safety was taught, preached, practiced and lived for two years before he was even allowed to take a shot with his BB gun with expreme [verbatim] -- extreme overwatch my myself.

My wife and I explained to -- to him that the Defendant, Carson, was in the bathroom working on a rifle and that the rifle went off by accident and hit his Aunt Stefanie, causing her to die.

His eyes started to water and his facial expression showed deep confusion. At that time I asked if he was okay and still wanted to talk about it.

He said, "I don't understand, Daddy. Why was Uncle Carson working on a rifle in the bathroom with Aunt Stefanie and Mo in there?"

Then his eyes got big and he started to cry as he asked something -- something that I still have a

hard time with. He asked, "No, Daddy, how could Uncle Carson be working on a gun and not know that it was loaded?"

To be honest, Your Honor, I couldn't answer him then, and I can't answer him now.

The day of the funeral was the hardest, by far, of my life. Watching the pain of two loving parents, the confusion of two young children, the mourning our entire family was going through, and seeing my kid sister laying in a casket which is more than any one person should have to hold in.

Just when I thought I'd reach the point that I could no longer be the strong one, my nephew grabbed my hand, standing behind the hearse that carried his mom, he gave me strength. He said, Uncle Randy, where are they taking my mom?"

In the back of my mind, I said, Thank you, Stefanie, as I knelt down and told him where we were going, and asked him if he wanted to lead the way.

He and I walked hand in hand following the hearse to the mausoleum, at which point he carried -- excuse me -- at which point we carried his mother's casket to her final resting place with him walking just in front of us leading the way.

He and I were the last to say I love you and good-bye to Stefanie.

Your Honor, have you ever walked a six year old to his mother's grave so that he could say good-bye? I can only hope that you haven't.

My nephews voice asking "Where are they taking my mom," will haunt me for the rest of my days, as will not answering the phone the night before her murder.

No longer will I receive phone calls of her laughing so hard that she was short of breath. No more will she call reminding me that the 24 hour showing of the *Christmas Story* is coming up, or that Mom's birthday is tomorrow and make sure that I call. No more will we poke fun at one another or laugh at ourselves. No more will she call out of the blue and spend an hour and a half on the phone.

Holidays, birthdays, family get-togethers, we can try as hard as we want, but they'll never be the same. They're nothing more than a reminder of one split-second of stupidity in which a mother, a daughter, and a sister was brutally taken away from us.

Stefanie was always the smart one. She could just walk by a book and be able to teach you what

was in it.

Outspoken, beautiful and funny as they come, and a great mother. She was the diamond of the family. I wish now, that I would have told her more often how proud of her I was.

I can see Stefanie in both of her children.

They're so cute and extremely smart for their ages.

Every day I worry about my nephew, Carson.

That little guy is still in a world of hurt all over of this, as he should be. Hearing of him making statements like, "I want to get a gun and shoot myself so that I can be with my mom," brings me to tears. It breaks my heart knowing what he and Moriah have gone through, and what -- and will continue to go through.

I can't even put into words the hurt or the concern that I have for my niece, Moriah, with her seeing what transpired between the defendant and her mother on that horrible morning at such a young age. I don't know if there are such words.

As I watch the video that played at Stefanie's funeral and typed this statement, tears roll down my face just as they did when I received the news of her -- news of her shooting.

You see, as a big brother, I was supposed to

protect Stef. Even as we became adults, I tried to do just that.

I can't tell you how many times I talked to her about the abuse or assault that she received from her husband, but she was terrified of what I might do, so she kept those things from me for a long while. I begged Stefanie to leave him before things could get any worse, but Stefanie truly believed that he could change.

That's the last thing I want to -- would like to talk about, Your Honor, is change.

Sure, I believe that people can change. But in order to do so, they have to have the desire to. William Carson Merrill has not changed one bit since I met him in junior high school. He has always been and will always be a reckless, careless, immoral, immature bully with absolutely no integrity and a complete lack of respect for anyone or anything, to include himself and the law of man.

He has always and will always take the easy way out and cut corners, break laws when he thinks no one is looking. Case in point, how many firearms did this convicted felon have?

It really -- it is really no surprise that

William Carson Merrill has taken the road of a coward in this case. Once again in his life, he refuses to stand up and face what he has done and is expecting everyone to forgive and forgot.

It is my belief and the belief of others that he truly expects to walk away from this with little to no punishment. After all, it's the story of his life.

One look at his record and anyone can see that he will always be a problem for society and for anyone in close or direct contact with him.

I'd hope after he served time a few years back, that he would straighten up and do right by his wife and kids. Apparently, that was just wishful thinking, as is thinking that he will ever be a benefit to himself, loved ones or society.

Your Honor, I'm begging you, please give
Will -- William Carson Merrill the maximum sentence
allowed by law. In doing so, you'll be provi -you will be providing my sister with a little bit
of justice; you will be protecting two very young
children from a guy that -- whom, at best, cares
only for himself; and you will possibly bring some
peace into my mother and father's lives again. But
most importantly, Your Honor, in locking him away

1	for as long as possible, you may very well be
2	saving another family from this hurt and saving a
3	life.
4	Thank you for this opportunity to speak.
5	THE COURT: Thank you.
6	MR. MATHIS: Ms. Rebostini would read the
7	mother's letter if that's all right with Your
8	Honor.
9	THE COURT: You may proceed.
10	MS. REBOSTINI: Your Honor, my name is Marilyn
11	Canady. I'm Stefanie's mom.
12	The death of my one and only daughter has
13	caused a hurt like no other. It has left an
14	emptiness and pain that will never go away. Our
15	lives have been changed forever. I can see the
L 6	pain and emptiness in her father's face, hear it in
L 7	his voice.
L 8	I am seeing Dr. Sharon Schulman for be
L 9	bereavement and grief counseling. My husband and I
2 0	are also involved in family court for the
21	termination of parental rights.
22	Since February 21st, 2012, my husband and I
23	have been encouraging, supporting, nurturing and
2.4	helping our grandchildren through this traumatic
25	tragedy that they are going through. Although the

children don't realize it, they are helping us just as much. These children have the ability to make you laugh, even when you may feel as though you will never be able to laugh again.

Like I told my grandson, sometimes in life we get pushed down, and some of those pushes can be really bad. But we pick ourselves up, brush off the dirt, and we move forward. We don't let these pushes keep us down.

On March 6th, 1981, I held my beautiful baby girl for the first time. Her body was so warm, so full of life. I kissed her forehead for the first time.

On February 20th, 2012, I saw Stefanie for what turned out to be the last time I would ever see her alive again.

Stefanie will no longer say, "Mom, will you make me a carrot cake for my birthday," or call me and say, "Mom, don't you want to make me a key lime pie," just because she wants one.

I will never hear "Happy Mother's Day" or "Happy Birthday" from Stefanie again.

Stefanie won't be reminding me to cut the celery and eggs small for the dressing at Thanksgiving this year or any other year. No

holiday will ever be the same.

2.0

I won't be receiving a phone call from her telling me, "You won't believe what your grandchild just done or said." She would be laughing so hard, you could barely understand what she was saying.

You would start laughing because her laugh was so infectious.

There is not a day that goes by that Stefanie isn't in my thoughts. To lose a child in such a horrific way, and the knowledge that her three-year-old daughter was in a bathtub of water just a few feet away as she lay on the bathroom floor dying.

To have my six-year-old grandson say, "Nanny,
I just want to get a gun and shoot myself because I
want to with my mom. I miss her. I love her."

To hear my three-year-old granddaughter say, "Nanny, when's my mommy going" -- "coming to pick me up?"

To hear her crying for the first time over her mom, and through those tears say, "Mommy, please come back home."

To hear her say, "I will always hate my dad."

It is wrong on so many levels for children to be put in a position that causes these feelings to

be felt and to be said. While playing in the bathtub with her toys, she said, "Okay, Mommy, I'm going out of the bathtub now," followed by, "Okay, sweetie. Be careful." That would possibly be the last words her mom said to her.

Stefanie missed her tiny little boy's seventh birthday; starting the second grade; getting his first report card of the year, for which he had made straight As; his excitement over joining the Cub Scouts.

Stefanie missed her little girl's fourth birthday; starting VPK; and writing her name for the first time; and being there to see her little girl taking pre-ballet and tap lessons.

Stephanie will miss their graduations, weddings. She will never know the overwhelming joy of being a grandparent.

As grandparents, we enjoy having our grandchildren with us every weekend. We are lucky as they are very comfortable at our home because it was their second home. They are adjusting well because our home is very familiar to them.

Every night my grandchildren and I say our prayers together. Afterwards, I say what the children call "the mommy prayer." I talk to

1 Stefanie, tell her about the children's day.

My grandchildren will say to me, "Nanny, do the mommy prayer. I want to talk to mommy." They speak of their day. Most of the time it's something that made them laugh that day. Their last words are always the same, "I love you, Mommy. Amen.

In a letter from the defendant, he asked my husband and I, Don't take me away from the kids, too.

We didn't. He did that the moment he aimed that gun at Stefanie and pulled the trigger. By law, he wasn't even supposed to own a gun because of his past behavior.

In one brief moment he destroyed everything that meant the most to my grandchildren. Not only their mom, but their pet, what they knew at home, and yes, even their dad. He took my only daughter from me and their family.

Stefanie's love for the defendant cost Stefanie her self-worth, self-esteem, self-confidence and ultimately, her life.

A husband is supposed to love and protect his wife. Stefanie said she loved him, even after the domestic violence incident with him being arrested.

Although at that time I advised her to come home and leave what her father and I perceived as an unhealthy situation, we now believe she chose to stay with him because of what we believe was pure fear of her own husband.

Whether recklessness, intentional, accidental or just plain stupidity, the end result is the same, Stefanie has been taken away from her two small children and her family.

I don't know what it's like to walk in the defendant's shoes, but unless you've been there, no one knows what it's like to walk in ours.

I see and hear firsthand what my grandchildren are going through, and no child should ever have to lose their mom in such a horrific manner at the hands of their own father, regardless of their age.

At the present time, Randy, myself and the children will move forward. We will provide the best nurturing environment possible, ensure they receive any counseling needed, and provide a loving and stable home to ensure they grow up to be responsible, respectful and productive members of society, just as their mother would have done.

Whether there'll be forgiveness for the defendant and his terrible actions of that day, we

believe that will be decided by a higher -- higher power than us and on the fin- -- and on that final judgment day.

On February 25th, 2012, I kissed my daughter's forehead for the last time. Her body so cold, so still, so lifeless. The day my granddaughter took me by the hand and said, "Come on, Nanny, let's go see my mommy." The day I watched my grandson walk in front of his mother's casket leading the way to her final resting place because he wanted to help his Uncle Randy.

Throughout his -- this tragedy, we have met some of the kindest, caring people who have shared in our deepest sorrow. And after all of this is settled, my husband and I hope to keep in touch with them. They will always have a special place in our hearts and our family.

Your Honor, no matter what the sentence is, it will not make the pain and suffering go away. It won't bring my daughter back, or make it easier for Stefanie's children and those of us who truly love and miss Stefanie, only time will.

The devastation and heartache that the defendant has caused me, her father, her brother and the rest of Stefanie's family is bad enough.

1	For what has been done to Stefanie's children,
2	there's no punishment severe enough. I hope and
3	pray that the defendant says [verbatim] the maximum
4	sentence that you can impose by law.
5	Thank you for allowing this opportunity to

1 MR. KOCIJAN: Yes, Your Honor. They were 2 previously provided in discovery to us.

THE COURT: Thank you.

MR. MATHIS: I don't have any further evidence for the State, Judge. If --

THE COURT: Any argument?

MR. MATHIS: Yes, sir, I would.

This is a very difficult case, and I -- I don't envy your decision in this case. I don't believe and it's not our position, that Mr. Merrill intentionally killed his wife in this case, which is why he was charged with manslaughter instead of murder.

However, the course of conduct that he followed was so reckless -- and I think those pictures clearly show -- in one of those pictures, there's actually a blowup showing the view through the range finder with the laser light on the victim's head, which is the same weapon that was used to kill her.

So this was not an isolated incident. It's clearly an egregious, reckless disregard for the safety of others with firearms by a man who's a convicted felon and wasn't supposed to have any firearms, much less an AK-47.

Even more serious, quite frankly, is the fact that the three-year-old child was in the bathtub and saw her mother being killed.

2.4

That morning -- our investigation has shown that Mr. Merrill left the house, took the older child to school, stopped and bought some beer and drank some beer that morning, and did not go to work. That's when this took place, after he got back to the house.

It's our position that a sentence in this case needs to be of such a length to ensure that by the time he gets out of prison, these children have reached the age of majority. They're going to need long-term counseling. They've lost their mother.

And even though I -- I have sympathy for his situation, it's our request he be placed in position -- in prison for no less than 20 years, followed by probation; that he not be able to have firearms, obviously; and that he not have any children with -- contact with the children while they're minors, while he's in prison, until such time as het's released and they're over 18 and then they can make the decision as to whether or not they want to have contact with him.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you.

Mr. Kocijan, does Mr. Merrill wish to say anything?

MR. KOCIJAN: He does, Your Honor. If he could address the Court.

THE COURT: Okay.

THE DEFENDANT: I would like to start by saying that I'm truly sorry what has happened that's brought us here today.

Mr. and Ms. Canady, Mom, Dad, our families, our kids and myself would not be in this situation but for my stupid decision. I take full responsibility for this tragic accident that has happened.

Stefanie is a mother, a daughter, a sister, a daughter-in-law, a sister-in-law, and Stefanie Merrill is my wife who we all love more than words. We wouldn't be here today if it were not for my actions. I'm so deeply sorry to everyone that we're here today.

I would like to talk a little bit about

Stefanie and myself and about who we are. Stef and

I met around 18 years ago. She was 13 and I was

14. And we were just starting to get into high

school, and we soon became young high school

teenage sweethearts.

Like many young high school sweethearts, we, too, would break up and go back out again. Even at times when Stef and I weren't with each other, we both wanted to be.

After high school we went our own ways, but we always sort of gravitated back towards each other.

Then at the age of 21, gravity worked its magic and brought our paths back together again.

There was no doubt in my mind, as soon as I saw her, that she was who I wanted to spend the rest of my life with.

I proposed to Stefanie and she said yes, with lots of tears and smiles. And I knew it was I who she wanted to spend the rest of her life with too.

Stef and I had been together for the past twelve years, with nine of those twelve, me being married to the woman of my dreams. And if you could ask Stef, she would tell you that nine of those twelve years, her being married to the man of her dreams.

With our marriage, we made each other so much more to this world than just a Stefanie and Carson.

With our marriage, Stefanie gained in-laws who she loved dearly, and who in return loved her as their own.

With our marriage, I gained in-laws. Mr. and Ms. Canady who I love like my own and has always made me feel loved as no less than their own, and whom I will always love.

With our marriage, Stefanie gained a whole gang of sisters and cousins, and she became both family and the best of friends.

With our marriage, Stefanie gained a son, Jackson, who though biologically was not hers, he was never the term stepson to her.

With our marriage, we became parents together. On March 1st, 2005, Stefanie gave birth to our first born, a boy. A big boy, weighing at 8 pounds and 14 ounces. There was no doubt in our minds what we wanted to call him, and so we named him Carson after me, his dad, and for the man that she loved.

Little Carson's first name was a no-brainer because both of our fathers' first names are Thomas. We wanted to honor them, and what a better way than naming our son after them. So we named him Thomas Carson Merrill.

But soon, the only name she heard him being called was Bubby. He's always been all boy. But most importantly, he's a mama's boy.

On August 28th, 2008, Stefanie and I were blessed again, a second time, when she gave birth to our second child, our girl, who barely tipped the scales in the direction of 7 pounds. And she was beautiful. And she had a smile on her face the day that she was born that stole our hearts.

We named her Moriah, after the mountain on which King Solomon built his temple.

Moriah's middle name we hadn't had a clue until my late Great Aunt Dee suggested that we name her Marie after my late grandmother, my dad's mom, Memaw.

Stef and I both lived with Memaw in Nashville
12 years ago prior to moving to Florida. Memaw was
a huge part of Stefanie and my life. To us it was
the per- -- it was perfect, so we named her Moriah
Marie Merrill.

But like her Bubby, she soon took on other names. To Stef she is Honey Bunny; and to Bubby she is Sweety; to me she is Beauty.

And like her brother being a mama's boy, she was all the way a daddy's girl.

Stefanie and I were becoming a perfect family and loving parenthood. Stefanie and I were very routine as parents and a family. Stefanie was a

homemaker and I only worked four days a week, so we had lots of family time together.

Every Wednesday was our family night out that we spent at McDonald's Playland. We would all eat, and then the kids would spend hours playing as Stef and I smiled and enjoyed the rotation of kids and parents that came in and as our kids played, it was as we joined their family time.

Thursdays was pizza/movie night at home.

Carson would always do his end-zone shuffle

screaming "Pizza/movie night. It's movie night."

And, of course, Moriah just screamed and spun in circles.

We would go from room to room, grabbing all the pillows and comforters off the bed to make a pillow pile in the living room, and eat popcorn and watch a movie.

Saturdays, Stef and I were so fortunate to have Nanny and Pawpaw who kept the kids while we had mom and dad time. We rarely went out. Mostly it was to walk on the beech, but we loved the intimate Saturdays that we shared.

During the summer we spent Sunday afternoons at the beach with my dad and our kids. Stefanie and I love each other, and we love being Mom and

1 Dad.

Stefanie, like our kids, had many aliases:

Stefanie is Moriah's Mommy. She is Carson's Mom.

She is Jackson, my son's, (indiscernible) Stefanie.

She's (indiscernible) Mama. To her parents,

Stefanie is Ms. Canady's Weewee. Stefanie is Mr.

Canady's Scooter. To my parents, she was Stef.

Sometimes misspelled Stefanie with a P-H, but

pretty much just Stef. But most of all, to my

parents, Stefanie is the best thing to come into my

life.

To me, she is my best friend, she's my lover. Stef and I had our own nicknames for each other since high school. They were so dear and personal to me that I'm going to miss hearing being called.

Stefanie is my wife, who I love like I've never loved anyone before. She is my baby, who I miss so very much and will for the rest of my life. There's a void that -- that will never be filled. Stefanie is a part of me that I was always lacking.

In 2007, Stefanie and I joined First Baptist Church of Palm Coast. The second week of July, I turned my life over to God and was born-again. I was baptized later that year in December.

Stefanie, who at 26 years old, for the first

time in her life accepted Jesus Christ into her life as her Lord and Savior. She was baptized in September 2007. It was one of the proudest days of our lives. We took little Carson, who loves church; then, of course, Moriah, when she was born.

Our church is where Stefanie had Moriah's baby shower.

We became very active in our children's ministry, where almost every Sunday, we, as a couple, husband and wife, taught a group, 15 or so kids, Bible lessons: Five year olds.

During the summer I became a leader in our Royal Ambassador group, in which I taught a boys' class of 20, sometimes more: First through third graders on Wednesday evenings at church.

Any time we were not working on our children's ministry, we were sitting next to grandma in church. I think that was Stef's favorite. She always enjoyed grandma and all the older ladies around us sing.

Like many young married couples, we had our share of great times and tough times. Stef and I were not perfect. We both fell short. One thing that's undeniable is that we love each other. Even in our worst of times, our love for one another

surpassed most marriages best of times and we were proud of that.

All this doesn't even begin to scratch the surface of the many, many memories that are so cherished in my thoughts every second, every minute, every hour of every day.

There are no words to express the sorrow that I feel. I truly feel -- Mr. Canady, Pawpaw, I'm sorry. I'm really sorry. I know that you loved Stefanie very much.

As a father, also, I know that your love for Stefanie is exactly the same unconditional love that I have Moriah, my daughter. That love for daddy's little girl that I too know all so well. I can't even imagine the pain that you're in for losing a child, losing Stefanie, your daughter.

I would never want you to feel any pain like this. It rips me apart inside that I have caused you this pain. This was an accident.

I would never want you to have to live without Stef, nor do I want to live without Stef, nor for our kids to have to grow up without their mother.

Mr. Canady, I'm so sorry for the pain that I've caused. I'm so sorry for your loss. I hope that some day you can forgive me.

Ms. Canady, Nanny, I'm so sorry. I know that you, too, love Stefanie very, very much. Nanny, I too am a parent to your grandchildren. You know how much I love Carson and Moriah, how much being a dad means to me. I can never imagine living without either of them, so I can only think that the pain you feel is so tremendous, unlike anything that you've ever felt.

I would never want you to have to go through this pain. I'm so crushed that I have brought this pain on you. This was an accident. I would never want you to have to live without Stefanie, either.

Ms. Canady, I'm so very sorry for the pain that I have caused. I'm so very sorry for your loss. I hope that some day you can forgive me.

This was an accident. I wish I could change things. I would gladly trade places with Stef to take the pain away from you both, so our kids could hug and kiss their mom once more. I wish I could hug and kiss Stefanie once more.

I didn't want to grow old by myself without Stefanie, my wife. I did not want our children to be without their mother.

Mr. and Mrs. Canady, I did not want you to be in pain, nor to have to outlive a child, to be

1 without Stef. Mr. and Mrs. Canady, I'm sorry. 2 Judge Zambrano, I'm sorry. This is not the happy ending Stef and I both wanted. I just ask 3 4 that the Court have mercy on me for my kids' sake, 5 for Stef's sake. 6 She would not want me taken away from our 7 kids. She would tell you that they need their dad 8 now more than ever; that this was an accident. 9 I'm sorry. Please have mercy on us. 10 That's it. 11 THE COURT: Mr. Kocijan. 12 MR. KOCIJAN: Judge, I think it's fair to say 13 this has been a terrible accident that happened. 14 First and foremost, Carson is -- admitted his 15 responsibility for his actions, silly actions. But 16 from day one, when it came to the investigation, 17 he's been cooperative with them with that --18 throughout the investigation. 19 He elected to resolve this case with -- I know 20 it's not a normal situation, but we had a couple of 21 choices and he did elect one of those options to 22 resolve this matter before Your Honor. I've had the opportunity to -- to only know 23 24 him for a few months while representing him. I

don't know if I've ever crossed anyone that has

25

been so much remorseful for the situation that they've created here. No doubt in my mind from the first moment he wakes up in that jail, this is what he thinks about, and it's the last thing that he thinks about as he's there, with a whole lot of remorse, many hours in between that.

From what I have known from talking with him and his family, his family is probably one of the most important things to him.

The neighborhood used to come and play at his house with his kids, and he would watch over them all. Spending every moment that he wasn't working with his family, it was the most important thing.

Made me realize what I lack as a father to my child, and he makes me aware of that and what more I can do from talking with him and spending any amount of time with him.

Nothing can undo this situation, but I know he would in a second, try to take the place, if he could, with his wife, and -- and would gladly exchange that.

I would ask the Court to -- to take into consideration his record. He has a fairly good record as it seems. I believe there's some driving on a suspended license and a grand theft charge in

his past history.

But we are asking the Court to take the -everything into consideration today. I think a -a testament to that is the amount of people that
have shown up on his behalf, willingly -- from out
of state, even -- to come here today to be present
to show their support.

By sending him away for a long period of incarceration, essentially is -- is destroying two families here, and he should have the opportunity to be -- to be present, to be involved to help raise what's left of his family and -- and do the best that he can for them.

We would ask the Court to down -- depart from the statutory guidelines. We understand that obviously he does need to be punished. I can assure this Court that the time that he has done so far, it's been a severe punishment to him. He, too, is grieving.

And -- and I feel like the times that we actually get to talk is part of an opportunity where he's not in with everyone else and he gets to express his true feelings and his -- his remorse that he's had for this situation. But he does deserve an opportunity to -- to be out, to be

involved, and to make something of his life for him and his family, and we'd ask the Court to take that into consideration today.

THE COURT: Thank you.

Mr. Carson, you having pled guilty to the offense of manslaughter with a firearm, the Court will adjudge you guilty of manslaughter with a firearm.

Clearly, this is a preventable and avoidable accident, if that's what you want to call it.

Your -- your conduct is tantamount to nothing less than reckless behavior.

When you were a convicted felon, you were not supposed to have a firearm, but you had quite an arsenal in your home. But as if that wasn't enough, you violated probably one of the most basic tenets of firearm ownership; that is whether loaded or unloaded, a firearm, it's a dangerous thing.

And you pointed it at the person you claim to love the most, and then you pulled the trigger, and then you took her life.

That conduct, however you want to describe it, whether it be an accident, mistake, or whatever it may be, carries a tremendous amount of ramifications.
